# Dame Laura Knight: I Paint Today

The exhibition celebrates the life and work of Dame Laura Knight and her love of the Worcestershire countryside. There are several pieces generously loaned by members of the Society, some pieces on loan from national and regional galleries and private owners and, of course, paintings which are part of Worcester Art Gallery's own permanent collection, including the three recent acquisitions.

As you will recall, two major works by Laura Knight – Lake Windermere from Orrest Head and Beulah No.2 – were acquired earlier this year with the support of benefactor Professor Rolf Olson. More recently, one of Laura Knight's beautiful etchings 'Carting Corn' set in the Malvern Hills, came up for auction and with a donation from the DLKS, the Gallery secured a successful bid.

We are delighted the DLKS has been able to play an important role in planning for the exhibition and we thank Heather Whatley and Marian Chester for all their efforts with this. 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Moving on to news about the **Society's archive**. Here is an up-date from committee member Virginia Seddon who, together with her husband Alan, has spent a great deal of time cataloguing and organising the archive material. We are most grateful for their meticulous efforts and, recently, for the part they have played in securing a new home for the archive.

#### The Dame Laura Knight Special Collection

In August this year we entered into a five year contract with Worcester Museum and Art Gallery (WMAG) to house our archive of books, letters, documents, photographs and general ephemera. Most of the spadework for this wonderful result was achieved by Heather and Marian as they collaborated with WMAG curators who were on a mission to assemble a prestigious exhibition of Dame Laura's work from January to July 2024.

It follows a lengthy but fruitless attempt to store our archive in Malvern Library.

The Dame Laura Knight Society is now pleased to offer access to these materials to any one engaged in academic research or simply with an interest or curiosity in Dame Laura's history, links and connections throughout her illustrious career.


Viewing of the Special Collection has to be by prior arrangement with us as the WMAG staff is not involved and the room housing the collection has to be booked in advance.

As mentioned in 'Forthcoming Events' on page 2, Alan Seddon is leading **a walk** around Colwall Village on 10<sup>th</sup> April and will talk about places associated with Laura Knight. Here is a little gem he came across in his research for the walk:

I recently trawled through the Colwall Village Society's archive hoping to find lots of information about the many years Laura and Harold Knight spent in the village. Much to my disappointment and surprise there was very little. However there was **one gem** published in their **June 2006 Newsletter** as follows:

Dame Laura Knight (1877-1970), one of Britain's most eminent women artists, was represented by a number of paintings in a recent sale at Philip Serrell of Malvern. One was a view from Belle Vue Terrace, Malvern, during a rainstorm. It fetched £40,000. A watercolour view from the hills towards Ledbury and Hay Bluff realised more than £2,000. Dame Laura lived in Colwall some time, painting local farming scenes. Some years ago when the present chairman of the Village Society first bought his house in Colwall, he happened to mention it to the Lady Mayor of Ealing in West London. 'Oh, I spent my honeymoon there,' she said, 'at the Park Hotel, and we were served breakfast by the artist Laura Knight.'

Our archive has very little in the way of tales and reminiscences about Laura and Harold's time in the Malvern Hills and it would be fascinating to compile a portfolio of them. If you, or any friends, neighbours, or relatives have any such memories I would be happy to receive them. Time is moving on and we need to capture this information before it is forever lost. # Opening of the Exhibition 'I PAINT TODAY' Worcester Museum and Gallery 13th January 2024


A great start to our new year will be the opening of the first LK exhibition at Worcester MAG for 12 years.

As you can imagine Curators' preparations have been going 'full pelt' for some time and we have been actively involved. Some members have generously loaned their paintings to add to the unique collection on display. Included is a newly acquired etching of 'Carting Corn' to which the Society made a large contribution.

Walk leaders have contributed to the creation of a **Laura Knight trail** showing places of interest for tourists/ visitors, on sale at the Gallery shop and at Malvern Tourist Information Centre from 13th January 2024.

Marian Chester and myself have been working on **an archives presentation** for a dtbf March and I have been asked to give **bite size talks** about DLK and her links with Malvern on March 12<sup>th</sup> and June 11<sup>th</sup>.

It's truly another exciting year for DLK and fortunate that WMAG is now able store our archives and to purchase more of her work. It must be recognition at last of her significance to the art of our county backed by willingness of the Local Authority to develop the Gallery as a dynamic centre expressing local needs.

If you are travelling to beautiful Cornwall next year, you may be interested to know of a couple of exhibitions in the pipeline:

- *The Exceptional Harold Harvey* 1st May to 28<sup>th</sup> September 2024 Penlee House Gallery, Penzance. Staged to commemorate the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the artist's birth.
- Capturing the Light St Ives Artists 1885 1914 1<sup>st</sup> April to 31<sup>st</sup> October 2024 St Ives Museum. Working with David Tovey, this exhibition will focus in particular on marine paintings produced during the period when St Ives was known internationally as 'the Mecca of the seascapist'.

#### **Exploding the Myths: Discovering the True Story of St Ives Art**

We were delighted David Tovey delivered the Autumn in Malvern Festival lecture this year and his talk, explaining how St Ives became an important art colony, was full of

fascinating insights and detail.

He began by giving a thumbnail history of St Ives art mentioning Turners visit in 1811 and Whistler in1884 then quickly moving on to Ben Nicholson, Barbara Hepworth and the focus on modernism. However, his research has shown that there is much more to learn about the history of St Ives art colony and that the big names often associated with the town have been over played.




David's talk at Colwall Village Hall was well attended

David's superbly illustrated talk

explained that St Ives was gradually 'discovered' by a number of artists from various countries such as the Frenchman Emile Vernier, the Americans Edward Simmons and Howard Russell Butler, as well as British artists such as Stanhope Forbes and William Titcomb (David's great grandfather).

David is passionate about this subject and is working with the curator at St Ives Museum to develop it into a centre for St Ives representational art which he feels has been long overshadowed by the modern art the town is known for.


The Herring Fishing

## Sale of Works at Auction – a small sample

#### 1. Mickey and his Moke Dame Laura Knight, RA, RWS (British, 1877-1970)

The present lot was painted in 1962, based on sketches held by the artist from her original work *A Man from Mousehole* which was painted in 1928, exhibited at The Leicester Galleries, London (cat. no. 25) and illustrated in the artist's first autobiography, *Oil Paint and Grease Paint* (p. 369); the work was also illustrated in *The Sphere* on 17th March 1928, just prior to the exhibition, but under the title of *Stonebreaker*.

On 17th December 1929 the S.S. Manulka of the Union Steam Ship Company sank in darkness and heavy fog approximately 70 miles south of Dunedin on her way from Melbourne Australia to

Wellington New Zealand. All the passengers were saved, but most of the cargo went down with the ship, including a consignment of the artist's pictures that included *A Man from Mousehole*.

Differing in the background, both depict an almost identical scene of a Cornish farm worker sat with folded arms - subsequently identified as Mr Johns (Witt library) - together with his working beast of burden, a donkey. In the original work lost at sea, the background depicts the local Cornish landscape with a tin mine on top of a hill, whereas this picture has simply a door and brick wall as a background.
